

Election of 1860 Debate

Description: We will put on a mock debate between the four candidates involved in the Election of 1860 – Abraham Lincoln, Stephen A Douglas, John Breckinridge, and John Bell. Each debate team will have a set of roles that need to be filled. Your team needs to decide who will be doing what.

Debate Team:

2 – Debaters

(Responsible for filling out script with appropriate answers based on reading article and textbook. Debaters will take turns in debate responding to questions.)

2 – Supporters

(Responsible for writing a 1-paragraph paper describing “why they are voting for [their candidate].” They can take on the role of a factory worker, slave, slave owner, or a farmer. Testimonials will be read aloud during debate.)

3 – Campaign Managers

(Responsible for creating the propaganda needed for the election. You might create mock campaign buttons, posters, or flyers. Most important though, they are responsible for creating a campaign poster that shows the party platform (what their candidate believes) on the poster.)

Grade: Each participate will receive a 10-point grade for their production and time-on-task during this debate.

Debate Script:

To be used by the debaters. Use this to follow along during the debate, but write your answers in your notebook. You can have both papers to read from during your debate.

Moderator: Ladies and Gentlemen, welcome to tonight's debate. As you all know, we live in a moment in our nation's history unlike any other. Kansas and Nebraska are erupting in violence. Recently, abolitionist John Brown brought violence to a federal arsenal, and the Supreme Court has recently said that no slave, ever, even if freed, can become a citizen. The challenges that remain ahead are not small, however, through debate, we all hope we can rise above.

First, let us go around the hall and we'll have each candidate introduce himself, where he is from, and what political party he represents.
